FROM THE **RECTOR**

When television shows are running low on their budget—having spent it on explosions, and lasers, and gigantic hordes of computer-generated zombies—a production crew will often resort to making an episode that requires no new sets, no new characters, and takes almost zero effort to make. You can think of this as the television equivalent of wearing a black shirt, taping a paper plate to your chest, and going out for Halloween as a panda.

These episodes are called "bottle episodes." The name comes from the original *Star Trek* series. When their budget was used up on battling giant reptiles or having Scotty beamup one-too-many cast members in a single episode, the producers would write a "ship-in-a-bottle" episode. It would only involve the main cast, and would only be shot on the set of the USS Enterprise (or a neighboring set they could sneak onto.)

Think of *Seinfeld's* "The Chinese Restaurant" (season 2, episode 11). Or any sitcom episode where the "gang" gets stuck in an elevator, a ski lodge, or a high school basement.

If you need another example—look no further than your annual Thanksgiving dinner.

Stuck in a room with all of your family's main characters—and some on the periphery who were willing to show up in the episode for a stipend

of turkey legs and dry stuffing—the American Thanksgiving Table is our annual bottle episode.

We laugh at family stories. We argue with one another. Someone gets frustrated and stews in the kitchen. Thanksgiving is always a confluence of all that is best and worst about each of our families.

And, as if we need more of an excuse for our lives to resemble a sitcom, we'll often break from our inter-character feuding and development, for a liturgy of, "What are you thankful for this year?" We go around the table and name the things we are thankful for.

For some families, this tradition is easy; for others, less so. When surrounded by all the history and characters of one's family, it can be difficult to play the role you are cast into—whether you are a Screech or Zach Morris.

"Give thanks for a grateful heart... because God's given Jesus Christ his son."

So go the opening lines of the classic 1993 praise and worship song, "Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart." A song that, for some unknown reason, still gets played at your local Community Thanksgiving Service.

No matter what our families are like, how our year has been, or all the myriad thoughts and anxieties, fears and pain that come with America's Annual Bottle Episode, we can give thanks with a grateful heart because of one sure and certain truth—that no matter who you are, what you've done, or where you find yourself, we have a God who loves us and wants a relationship with us.

This is no passing fling; God goes to extraordinary lengths to get to us. He sent his Son into the world to sit at our Thanksgiving dinner tables. He sent his Son into the world to

be stuck in our bottle episodes. God sent Jesus Christ to free us from the same, boring bottle episode and invite us into the wider reality of God's unconditional grace and love.

This Thanksgiving, as I sit around the family dinner table—having just argued with my brother about tax policy and sparred with my sister about the meaning behind the year's best indie movies—I will have a lot to be thankful for:

For Holy Trinity, for its people, its love, and its hospitality.

For our staff, vestry, and volunteers, who give so much of themselves for the life of the church.

For all of you who have invited Ashley and me into your hearts and lives.

For all the best times we've shared in the past year; and all the worst.

For everything that is coming next; and all that we have yet to even begin to imagine.

But above all, I give thanks to God—with a full, and grateful heart—"for the redemption of the world through his Son, Jesus Christ; for the means of grace and for the hope of glory."

Because I know that no matter what this year's bottle episode brings—episode 11, season 30—I know that God loves me, forgives me, and empowers me to share that love with others.

This year, may your family's bottle episode be humorously typical; and may you know, as you go around the table giving thanks, that God loves you more than you could ever believe or imagine; that no matter what your Thanksgiving is like—that God gives thanks for you.

"Walking in Love" Story

"The church is not a building! The church is not a steeple! The church is not a resting place! The church is the people!"

This beginning verse of a children's Bible School action hymn is how I think of Holy Trinity, a welcoming body of Christian people walking together in the love of Jesus. The priests and laity of this church have kept me rooted for almost 50 years.

Love abounds at Holy Trinity. It is truly evident in the way we care about and serve one another, and in the way we reach out to those in need beyond our church family through IHN and Kitchen of Hope. I have witnessed this love countless times in our church children -- in the beautifully designed cards they have made for shut-ins, in their singing for the residents of Manor Care, as they fought to push Marla in her wheel chair and provide her with treats, and as they trimmed a tree for an elderly parishioner.

There is also no shortage of examples of the love spread by the adults of Holy Trinity, who are the mentors and role models for our young people. Holy Trinity members make meals for one another, visit the sick and shut-ins, pray for each other, attend/support plays, concerts and sporting events of our youth, etc. .

A few years ago I was overwhelmed with the offers of help with rides to Philadelphia when Gar was in the hospital and later that year when unexpected meals arrived for many days after my surgery – all from our church family. Yes, love does abound here.

I realized how much our daughter Susan valued her church family when she was making her wedding guest list. Near the top were Holy Trinity people, including her youth group leader, Sunday School teachers, other adult role models, and the priest who served Holy Trinity when she was growing up.

I am thankful that Gar and I found a church 48 years ago where we have been able to grow in faith, worship God, and walk in love with the congregation of Holy Trinity. I will never forget the members whose faith inspired me along the way and the friendships of the Holy Trinity people who have since moved or passed away.

My hope is that this place will continue to flourish long after we are gone. Through a yearly stewardship commitment to a generous pledge of time, talent and treasure, we can ensure that Holy Trinity will be here for future generations.


Melissa know! And please plan on attending the 5:00 service on Christmas Eve: it will be a wonderful pageant and service!


FROM THE WARDENS

WORSHIP



By volunteering to be a host site for IHN's overnight guests program, Holy Trinity helps offer a temporary home for families in need.

Volunteering with IHN includes providing meals and other needs, offering fellowship and company to the families, providing rides to-and-from Family Promise offices, as well as being a host site for up to four families


