**D**o you know that we have a mission statement? That might seem very 1993, but I think it's an important thing for a church to have. When I arrived at Holy Trinity, we had a mission statement that dated back to the late-90s and early-2000s. Do you remember it? (It's okay if you don't). It was:

*Holy Trinity's mission, inspired by Jesus' mandate to love and serve one another, is to create a supportive community where people can develop and nourish their relationship with God through worship, education, and fellowship.*

Now, that's a strong mission statement—better than most that came out of the turn-of-the-millennium mission statement boom. But is it memorable? Is it easy? And does it direct what we do?

The main reason I wanted to change our mission statement has nothing to do with erasing the past or making a bad thing good: none of that is true.

My main goal was to find a mission statement that meant something to us. And I admit, I have not done a great job of teaching it, or focusing our work on it, of encouraging and moving the congregation to do it. There's a lot of reasons why, but there's always excuses.

So, what I want to do, for the next year, is to start writing, teaching, preaching, working, out-reaching, in-reaching, and grounding everything we do in this statement. Because I think this is the work of the Church, and the way we participate in the already occurring work of Christ.

Let's break down the mission statement and see if we can get on the same page:

## Proclaim

We shout it from the roof tops. We know, we live it, we love it. We participate in it through our words and deeds, through our thoughts and actions, through our giving and receiving. Everything thing we do—like the air we breathe and the water we swim in—shouts as loud as it can the Good News of God's Grace to Everyone

## The Good News

You hear me use this term all the time. In Greek the word is *evangelion*. It means “good news” or “news of victory.” The Good News was what the king would receive when a battle had gone in his favor. When Jesus started his ministry, he adapted it for His Kingdom. No longer was the “good news” news of military victory; but good news of Christ's victory over death. The Good News is that God sent his son into the world to save the world. The Good News is objective truth—it doesn't matter what you think about it, it remains true. Through his life, death, and resurrection, Jesus transformed the world 2000 years ago on Calvary's hill. As the hymn says: “The battle is o'er, the vict'ry won!”

## Of God's Grace

But the Good News is not just about Jesus' saving work. It's not only about sin and death. It's all about grace. Grace, *charis* in Greek, means “loving kindness,” “good-

will,” “well-regarded,” or “favored.” Grace is the beautiful, amazing, offensive, unconditional truth that Jesus came to seek and save the lost. That the Good News isn't for people who have it all together. It isn't for the better-becoming-best. The Good News is for people who are used to bad news. It's Good News to folks who need good news. And Grace is not just about us—but about the whole world. The whole world has been changed and is changing; and we have been given the grace of God in Christ—through participation in his death and resurrection—by finding our place and hope in the Cross—to reach out and proclaim the Good News of the Grace we have received. Grace is a contagious disease: no one wants it (we prefer justice and righteousness), but we get it anyway. And as soon as we do, we can't but help to give it to others. Grace is something begrudgingly received but gloriously given away. It's the favor God shows us to bring us into his master-plan, to allow us to participate in the reconciling work that brings the whole world and all of creation back to God. It's our invitation to participate in that work. And it is good!

## To Everyone

This one might seem obvious, but the Good News of God's Grace is not for some, it's for everyone. We need to hear it and be reminded of it every, single day. We need to participate in it (through the sacraments) so that we can go out into the world and participate in it through our words and deeds, inspired by the Holy Spirit. Of course, everyone includes everyone else who isn't us. The families in need, our neighbors, friends, colleagues, and acquaintances. The Good News of God's Grace changes everything—and no one will want to miss out in participating in that amazing work.

## We proclaim the Good News of God's Grace to Everyone.

As this year ends, keep your eyes, and your ears, and your hearts open to God's Grace. Because next year you are going to be sick of this. And you'll never want to hear me mention it again. And you'll beg me to talk about anything else. But God willing, and the Spirit working, by the end it will transform us. The Good News of God's Grace will transform us. So that we can participate in transforming of the world.

I can't wait.

In Christ,

In the 1995 movie *A Walk in the Clouds*, starring Keanu Reeves, Paul Sutton—a returning WWII army sergeant—stumbles into the life of one Mexican-American family and their vineyard in the Napa Valley. Posing as the husband of the smart, free-spirited Victoria, Paul learns more about himself and this family as their relationship develops.

Arguably, one of the best scenes in the movie is when the family gathers for the traditional grape stomp. With music playing, and all the grapes poured into a large tank, the whole family dances and cheers and stomps the grapes to make the wine. The joy is contagious, the connection palpable. It's this scene of joyful celebration and that type of effortless work that comes from a place of freedom and play. That joy draws Paul and Victoria together and it's beautiful.

Joy like that—joy at an abundant harvest, at our many blessings, at the ways in which God provides—joy like that comes with a powerful freedom. One where it's impossible to look foolish; where the only appropriate reaction is song, and dance, and celebration. That is the Freedom of the Harvest.

The grape stomp scene from *A Walk in the Clouds*, is probably one of my favorite harvest scenes in a movie.<sup>1</sup> It's my favorite—but not for the reasons you might think.

The Harvest has always been a time of celebration and in-gathering. Sometimes, it's a celebration mixed with fear and anxiety in times of famine; other times it's unbridled celebration, a time to share, and give, and party in times of surplus.

As fall turns to winter, and the trees turn from their beautiful browns and reds to the barren and gnarled greys—we are invited into a time of celebration and freedom. A time that may be hard to embrace, but that is waiting there for us.

In Galatians, Paul writes, “For *freedom* Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and let us not return to a yoke of slavery” (Gal 5:1).

The holiday season is one that comes its own anxieties and stresses. Will there be enough? Will we get/give the right things? What will my family say or do when they are all together? With the world like it is, how do we give thanks?

The Good News of our shared life in Christ is that we no longer need to worry about “enough.” We live

in the Kingdom of God, where the harvest is always plentiful, and the workers always few. We live into a freedom—the freedom and joy and fun of the grape stomp, of good family dinners, of food to feed everyone.

As Christians, our hope is not to *have* “enough,” but, regardless of where we find ourselves, to know that Christ *is* “enough” for everyone.

As we gather once again to rejoice at the harvest—the hearty crops and the withered crops, the abundant crops and the lean crops—may we rejoice in the knowledge that in Christ, there is always good and abundant freedom and joy to be found.

And if you do find yourself getting a little more anxious and a little less free, come find me—reach out—because God's blessing and our harvest is for everyone. And together, we can rejoice at the harvest.

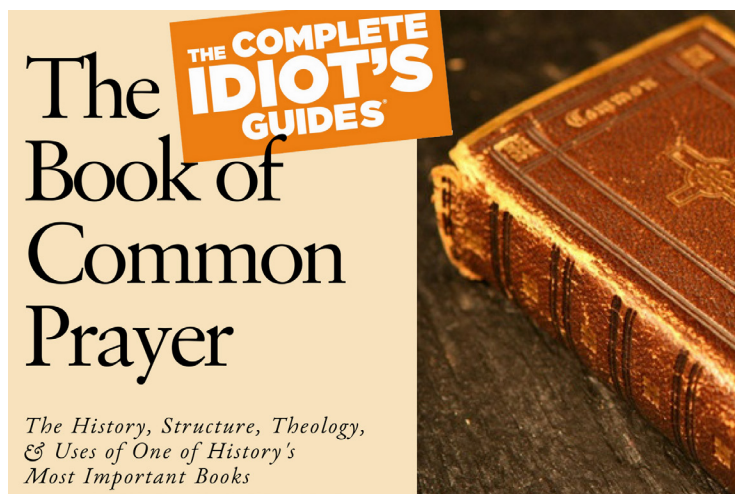

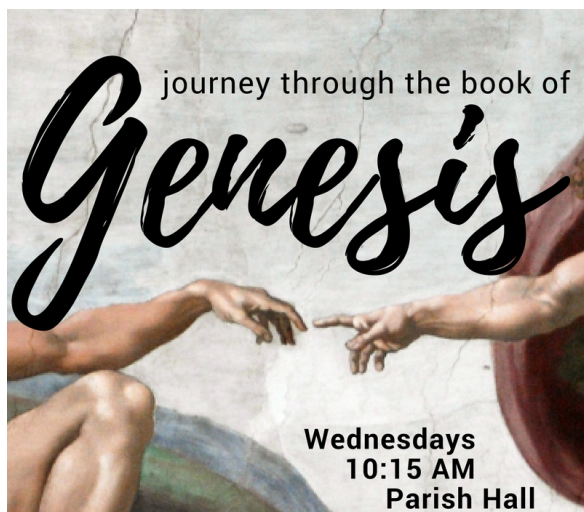

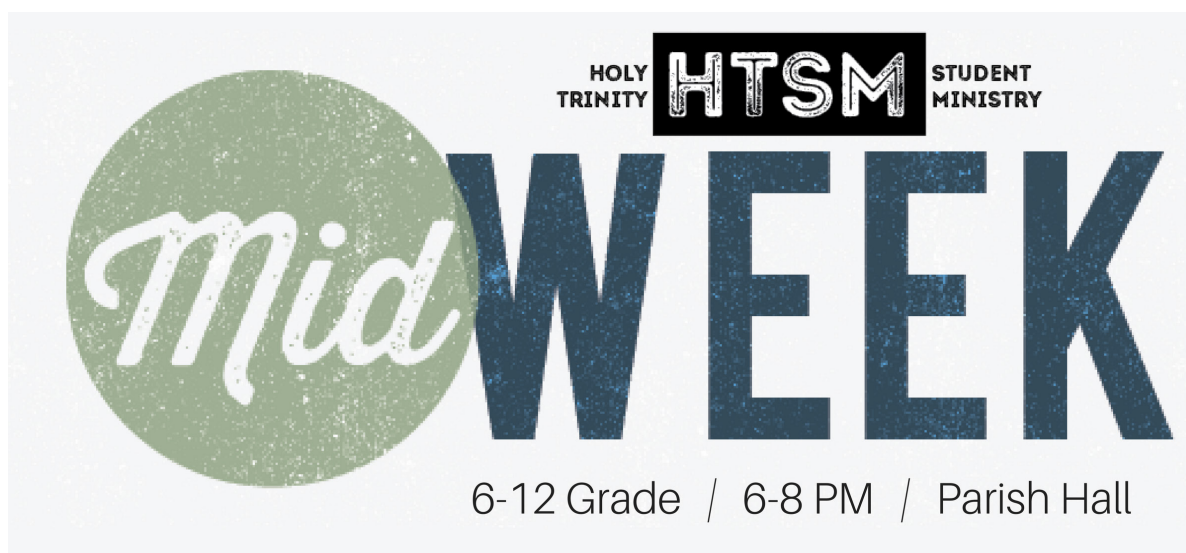
