Fr. Ben Maddison Called as New Rector

As most of our congregation knows by now, we have called our new Rector - Father Ben Maddison, who will be joining us in mid-January.

The long and thorough search process involved a major commitment by the Discernment Committee and support from the Vestry in coming to the conclusion they did. The Vestry voted to honor the Discernment Committee's ranking of the three major candidates and the Wardens followed up to explore their level of interest. Father Ben was at the top of our list and we were at the top of his.

A native of South Jersey, Father Ben earned his Master of Divinity from the Virginia Theological Seminary in June of 2015, and began his career as a Curate of St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Waco, Texas.

The Discernment Committee was impressed with Father Ben's passion for proclaiming the Gospel, his contagious enthusiasm for youth, mission and ministry, and a practical grasp of church realities in today's world. He is knowledgeable about the National and Diocesan Episcopal Church direction and even gave us insight into local mission opportunities.

Moreover, he is outgoing, dynamic and fun to be with. His

sermons are most importantly Christ-centered. They are also enjoyable, substantive, and relevant to daily life. While extroverted, he is skillful in drawing individuals out and listening well to their concerns.

Among his accomplishments at St. Alban's were starting three ministries (college, young families and small groups) coordinating fellowship events, and revising church branding materials to attract newcomers.

He will be moving from Waco and arrive at his new Rectory on the weekend of January 14 (his wife, Ashley, who is attending law school at Rutgers-Camden, will join him at that time.) He will begin work on January 16, 2017, with his first services on Sunday, January 22.

In the meantime, we still have a few weeks to go, and there are several things I would like to clear up. First of all: We Are Not in Desperate Straits! Evidently there has been some concerns about Holy Trinity's ability to become "healthy" again. This is not the case. Yes, attendance has been down, but it has actually been coming back up again. Yes, the rectory cost us a considerable amount of money to restore, but it actually cost us only about half of

what we budgeted. Our Stewardship Campaign – New Consecration Sunday – was a positive and

effective experience. We had a difficult and stressful interim, but because we had a firm foundation we have come through it – through the desert – into a very positive place. We are moving from strength to more strength, from positive to more positive. We Are Holy Trinity and We Are AMAZING!!!

Ok, now that we have that out of the way, let me tell you about how the next month's Sundays will go. Pastor Ken Regan, of Holy Nativity Lutheran Church, continues to do all of the Saturday services, both at his church and at ours (for which we are eternally grateful!). On Sunday, December 4, Steve LoCastro will lead morning prayer at both services, and on December 11, Charles Thorne will do the same. On December 18, the Rev. Clare Fischer-Davies will return to help us celebrate the end of Advent. Christmas Eve will bring us the Rev. Javne Oasin for both the 5:00 and 11:00 services, which will be absolutely delightful on so many levels! If you would like to go to church on Christmas Day, which is Sunday, December 25, Holy Nativity Lutheran Church has invited our people to join them for their 10:30 a.m. service. On New Year's Day, Sunday, January 1, 2017, we will have one spoken service at 10:00. January 8 and 15 the Rev. Clare Fischer-Davies will return to us for a final couple of weeks. (cont. on pg. 3)

A Message From Fr. Ben



Dear Friends,

It is my personal opinion that Advent is the "best" liturgical season. The colors, the music, the readings, the decorations—it's church at its best. But my favorite part of the Advent season is its main theme—expectation! We remember and celebrate that first, surprising birth of Jesus to Mary and Joseph in that stable in Bethlehem, and look with sure and certain hope that a day is coming when Christ will return-when every tear will be wiped away and death and pain will be no more. The expectation of Advent is this beautiful interplay between the "both/and," the "already here/not yet."

One of the things we forget, I think, is that expectation and anticipation are not all hearts and flowers. We look with hope to the promised future of Christ's return, but we still live in the real world. And the real world, especially during the holidays-and Advent-can be really tough. The family strain is felt acutely around Thanksgiving and Christmas tables. We feel pressure to compete with our neighbors over decorating, parties, gift-giving. We worry if our loved ones are alone; we feel anxious about uncertainties with jobs, and work, and relationships. And we face all this while trying to put on the best face possible for our friends and family-both in person and online.

Advent might be a season of expectation and anticipation, but

it's also a season of anxiety and pressure. How fitting, then, that Advent should be the season that precedes my arrival at Holy Trinity. I am bristling with hope and excitement and expectation. I cannot wait to be with all of you, to get to know you and to hear your stories and to participate in God's work with all of you in Wenonah. I spend a lot of my time thinking and dreaming about being with all of you in person! I hope that you are similarly excited about my arrival.

But, if I'm honest, I'm also nervous about the transition. Will all the pieces come together to make my move from Waco to Wenonah easy? Am I doing everything I should right now to prepare for this new and exciting call? How can I best care for Holy Trinity while being 1600 miles away? Will I hit the ground running—like the consummate professional I am—wowing everyone with my energy and excitement? Will I meet my own expectations and hopes?

Now, as then, my hope remains the same: "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord." (Luke 2:10-11)

My hopes and expectations, my worries and anxiety, they are all

grounded and met in the person of Jesus Christ, incarnate from the Virgin Mary more than 2000 years ago. In that singular and unexpected act, God set in motion a plan that would be completed in Jerusalem some 30 years later—a plan to bring all people and all things back to Godself.

As we live into the Advent season—a time of expectation and uncertainty, hope and fear—may you know that everything has already been completed in Jesus Christ. May you look with expectation to that promised future reality often seems to belie. And may you know that I am praying for all of you and am so excited to arrive and be with you, face-to-face.





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Treasurer's Report

What goes into making up the Rector's compensation package?

When you look at the compensation package we offer our Rector, there are a number of items listed. How did we choose on what and how much to offer? Well each item and the minimum amount to be offered are mandated by the diocese. So how did the diocese come up with these figures? The diocese relies on the Standing Commission on Clerical Compensation; a committee made up of elected clergy and lay members, to review clergy compensation and make recommendations to the diocese as to what to offer and at what level. These recommendations are then voted on at the annual diocesan convention.

The current package consists of 7 primary elements; Base Stipend, Pension Assessment, Insurance Premiums, Housing Subsidy / Housing Equity allowance, SECA offset, Professional Expenses and Continuing Education. There are also vacation and time off requirements, but that's for another article. So how does this all break down?

First of all, we have the stipend, or the Rector's actual annual salary. The minimum base salary for all clergy mandated by the diocese is \$36,300. This amount is increased by 2.5 % for each year of credited service (time a priest has served as a full-time priest) for up to 10 years. The increase then drops to 2% per year for credited service between 10 to 20 years. On top of that is an annual suggested cost of living adjustment (COLA). So, for example, clergy with 2 years of credited service would get a stipend of \$38,137 a year.

Contributing towards the Rector's pension is the next element. The amount we pay is determined by a calculation based on elements of the Rector's package multiplied by 18%. In 2017 we will contribute \$11,344.53 towards our Rector's pension. We also must provide the Rector, at no cost to him, a life insurance policy and health and dental coverage for him and his family. The diocese provides us with access to group coverage policies to help control costs. In 2017, we will contribute \$20,986.80 for this benefit.

The next item is the housing subsidy/housing equity allowance. If you don't provide a rectory, you must provide a minimum of \$16,000 to help pay for the Rector's rent or mortgage. Since Holy Trinity provides a rectory rent free to the Rector, we are required to pay an annual minimum of \$2300 towards their housing equity allowance. This is money paid into a 403b account for the rector to compensate them for not gaining equity by owning and selling a private residence. Additionally, there are the rectory utility costs (electric, gas, water, sewer, etc...) that we are required to cover. We need to list these because the utilities and the fair rental value of the rectory (\$15,000) are used in determining the Rectors Social Security taxes and our SECA offset payment. We have budgeted \$4,000 toward rectory utilities in 2017.

We come now to the Self-Employed Contributions Act Tax or SECA offset. Clergy are considered employees for federal taxes (state and federal taxes are withheld from their pay), but are self-employed where Social Security is concerned. This means they must pay the entire 15.3% of the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) tax due. This amount is usually split down the middle by the employee and employer. Even though the government considers the clergy as self-employed, the diocese considers clergy as employees, so we are required to compensate the Rector for the employer's half of the FICA tax due. In 2017 we will pay \$4,511.14 towards this tax.

Then there are the professional and continuing education allowances. These are accountable expense accounts that the Rector can draw against to reimburse his professional expenses (travel and business, clerical supplies, etc....) and education expenses (seminars, conferences, etc....). In 2017 we will earmark \$4,500 and \$1,008 respectively towards these accounts. Unused funds in the continuing education account can accrue from year to year for up to 7 years.

While on surface it looks quite complicated to figure this all out; in reality it is rather simple. The diocese provides a matrix that we plug in years of service and the insurance plan we will offer and press enter. The matrix then lists the minimum requirements for all of the required elements. Of course, these are the required minimums, but if we want to (and if we can afford it) we can always exceed these numbers. We hope that our new Rector can help us to grow Holy Trinity to the point where we can one day go beyond just offering the minimum requirements!
